
The sessions were a huge success, students and staff thoroughly enjoyed the experience and we will be hosting these events again in the near future!


World Book Day 5th March 2020

The Star Outside My Window


I really enjoyed reading this book it was captivating and it hooked me straight away, I was so engrossed in the book I couldn't even put the book down!


I would recommend this book to people who love astronomy or adventure, but it can cause some distress for people like Aniyah suffering from Domestic abuse.

Some examples of how the students related to the '**Find Your Brave**' campaign was by explaining to staff and their peers within the group, a new skill they had learned, how they had overcome something they were scared of and how they had managed to deal with a particular difficult time within their lives. The children enjoyed sharing their experience and as a result this is something we will repeat again on a more regular basis.










Christmas Movie Night
