Yasmin Booth who became a Special Olympics gold medallist this July. Yasmin, who was part of the Great Britain golf team flew to Berlin to face tough competition, walking away victorious.

Beginning in Stuttgart, the host city, Yasmin was greeted by the mayor at the Town Hall. Volunteers from a global organization called Lions, also met athletes, helping them with luggage and finding their way around the city. In Stuttgart, a full schedule of activities and training took place at the FC Stuttgart Ground, including team-building and a tour of the Mercedes Benz Museum.

After an eight-hour coach, Yasmin arrived in Berlin where her training would begin. She met WWE star, Drew McIntyre, allowing the chance to have photograph and autograph. Appointments with Healthy Athletes also took place to check her feet, ears and teeth.

At the opening ceremony, teams dressed in their full kit. A spectacular 40,000 people filled the Olympiadstadion to hear Tim Shriver (activist for disability rights, film producer) give a speech, son of Eunice Kennedy, the founder the Special Olympics in 1968, along with various dancers, robots, animatronics, DJs and acts.

160+ countries all streamed into the stadium team by team, and the build up and emotion was spectacular. Yasmin and her mum walked in hand in hand to see the crowd, and feel the energy in the space.

Over the course of the 21st and 22nd of June Yasmin shone, earning a gold medal, for which Crompton House is immensely proud of her for achieving.

The experience was a truly momentous occasion, celebrating unified sport and pushing for more rights and less barriers for people with disabilities.

We wish Yasmin all of the best for the future and we can't wait to hear more about her successes.

Oonagh McManus won the European Biathle Championships representing Great Britain in Munich improving on her bronze medal from last year in Athens in June. 29 competitors made the finals in Munich from all over Europe.

Oonagh had a very good start in the first 800m run, going through the first tight section of the course in 3rd place. She took the lead at around 600m, closely followed by a Czech athlete and a GB team mate. She entered transition and after removing her shoes she entered the water in first place. A fantastic swim gave her a 10 metre gap exiting the lake, and another impeccable transition saw her start the final 800m run with a comfortable lead. She pushed on and with 200m to the finish had created 15 seconds gap to second place. She turned the final corner and crossed the finish line, taking a comfortable victory. A brilliantly executed race with everything going to plan. A dream come true.

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
Swanage 2023 July- by Jenna Wrigley

Favourite artworks, that featured in many of the students photographs, included sculptures by Erwin Wurm and Damien Hirst. The students were a credit to the school and we look forward to seeing them embark on their GCSE Art courses in September.

In June a group of 50+ Year 12 students ventured out into the mountains of North Wales and the Lake District to complete their Gold DoE practice & qualifier expeditions.




