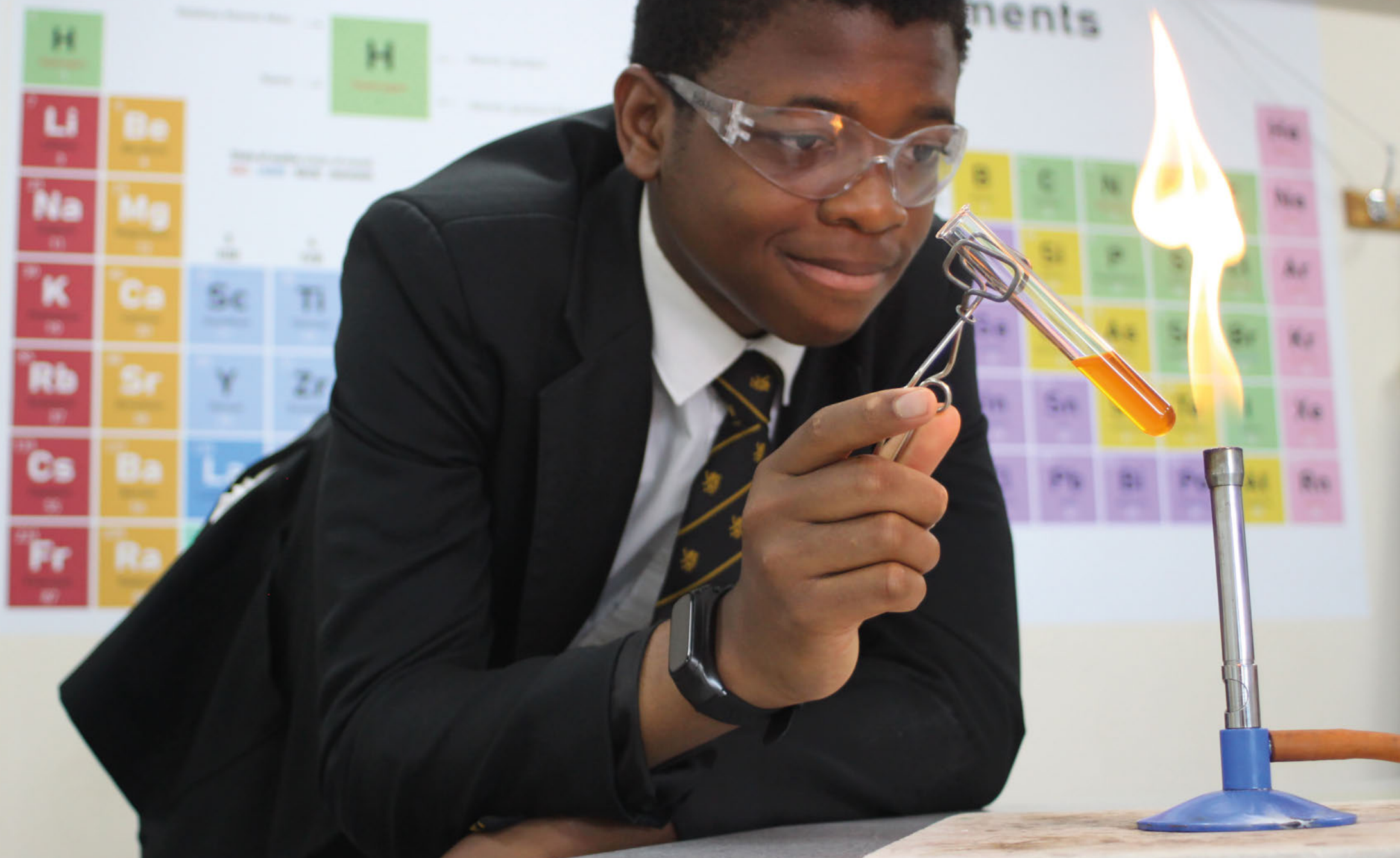

# Learning at Crompton House School

We aim to develop students' abilities to learn independently, with a life-long love of learning, ready for their adult lives. We encourage all students to use initiative, be creative, work with others in teams, solve problems and be confident communicators. Lessons are active, busy and purposeful, using new technologies and stimulating resources with activities to suit the needs of all students, whatever their learning style or ability.

## The Curriculum

Our curriculum is flexible, accessible and ambitious and designed to broaden and deepen our students' knowledge, skills and understanding.

Students in Years 7 to 9 study English, Maths, Science, Modern Foreign Languages (French or Spanish), Religious Studies, Physical Education and PSHE (Personal, Social and Health Education) as well as Food & Nutrition, Design Technology, History, Geography, Art, Drama, Music and Computer Science. Students choose their GCSE pathways in Year 9. In Years 10 and 11, students can study additional subjects such as Business Studies, Design Engineering, Health and Social Care, Media Studies, I Media, Separate Sciences, Sociology, and Sports Studies. Our pathways system also includes opportunities for students to follow an ambitious EBacc route and therefore follow a humanities subject (Geography or History) and a Modern Foreign Language at KS4.

## Religious Education

As a Church of England school Religious Education is part of our core curriculum for students in Years 7 – 11, with all students sitting the GCSE Religious Studies in Year 11. The main aim of Religious Education is to encourage respect for all beliefs and cultures as well as helping to promote the students' spiritual, moral, physical and cultural development. We follow the Manchester Diocese and the Oldham Local Agreed Syllabus. A strong emphasis is placed on teaching about the Christian religion. Learning about other faiths, including Judaism and Islam enables our pupils to understand the beliefs of other people in their community.

## Future Ready (Careers) Guidance

Our Future Ready curriculum strives to achieve the best outcomes for all our learners by ensuring they get the support they need to make well informed, realistic decisions about their future through careers education, information, advice and guidance. We hope to empower our learners by informing them of how they can access the advice and guidance to help them plan for a successful future and offer all our young people access to impartial and independent careers guidance through our careers advisor.

Our Future Ready program includes lessons on the world of work, opportunities for work experience and detailed real-world information / knowledge from our partnerships with employers, Higher Education institutions, training providers and alumni. The majority of our Year 11 students transfer to our popular and highly successful Sixth Form.

## Homework

Homework is seen as an important part of school life and an integral aspect of study. All students have a homework timetable that is designed to spread the load evenly throughout the week. Initially students can expect to have up to two hours homework in a day. Homework assignments are communicated to students, parents and carers through an online platform.

## PSHE

PSHE is an important part of our holistic curriculum for students. We aim to fulfil our statutory responsibility to support students' spiritual, moral, cultural, mental and physical development and prepare them for the experiences, opportunities, and responsibilities in life.

Our PSHE education incorporates health education, relationships education and economic wellbeing and careers. We ensure that we meet the government statutory guidelines for delivering PSHE, and also tailor our curriculum to meet the specific needs of our students.'

## Teaching groups

Throughout Years 7 – 9, students are placed into ability groups for all subjects apart from Food & Nutrition, Design Technology, Computer Science and Art, which are taught as mixed ability groups. Progress is regularly monitored using a combination of formative and summative assessment alongside Personalised Learning Checklists.

## Sixth Form

Sixth Form students are role models to all students. They support and help students throughout the school and carry out prefect duties, paired reading with Year 7 students, mentoring with other main school students and they organise their own fund-raising events and participate in a wide range of extra-curricular activities. They have their own dress code and their own Sixth Form Centre which contains a cafeteria, ICT suite and several study areas.

## Supporting Pupil Development

### Crompton House is Inclusive

We provide a broad and balanced curriculum for all students and full support for every student. The school is committed to meeting the needs of all our students, including those who have Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND). However, the school does not have a specialist base for students who have SEND and can therefore only cater for these students in mainstream lessons. Our Pastoral Support Team consists of a Careers Adviser, a qualified nurse, five Heads of Year and five Assistant Heads of Year. Our Inclusion Support Team consists of a SENCO and Assistant SENCO and a Higher-Level Teacher Assistant. We have 2 Level 4 Teaching Assistants who oversee our Year 7 Transition, support our students at SEN Support Level and oversee our internal Interventions. The Inclusion Management Team are supported by a team of Teaching Assistants who help pupils overcome barriers to learning in mainstream lessons.

### Crompton House is academically rigorous

We set ambitious targets for students' academic performance, and these are monitored regularly. Parents are informed of progress systematically throughout the year via well-embedded Personalised Learning Checklists and summative assessment short reports.

## Supporting Success, Encouraging Respect

We expect all our students to behave in a responsible manner, showing consideration, courtesy and respect to other people at all times, both in school and when travelling to and from school. We encourage a commitment to the school and a high degree of mutual respect between staff and students. Our system of rewards and sanctions is applied consistently and fairly. We prefer to give praise and encouragement rather than criticism. Students who produce an outstanding piece of work, make a good effort, or help others in their work are awarded Merits. A number of students are also selected each week to receive the Headteacher's Award. We have a uniform card system to encourage students to maintain high standards in appearance. Throughout the year, we praise and reward effort and work in dedicated assemblies, newsletters, prize giving and on the school website. Mobile phones should not be seen or heard in school. The confiscation period for a mobile phone is 7 full days inclusive of weekends.

### Class Charts & Parent Portal

Using Class Charts, parents can keep track of their child's behaviour, view attendance records, access their weekly timetable, track scheduled detentions, and view announcements from school. Class Charts for parents can be accessed via their website, or through the iOS and Android apps. The Parent Portal is a single and secure communication gateway between home and school, allowing parents to access key information about their child such as reports, progress data and school communication. It will also provide parents with a calendar of upcoming events. Parents can also use the portal to view communications between school and home and you can use the portal to quickly and easily update contact information. The parent portal has proved to be a great resource for parents, ensuring that they are fully up to date with school life.

# School & Church

## Our Faith

As a Church of England School our faith underpins our care for all students. At Crompton House, each day starts with a collective act of worship which may be form worship, collective worship or Head of Year assembly. These are led by the Headteacher, Senior Staff, visiting clergy or students themselves. Our assemblies provide an opportunity for the school to meet together, with time to be quiet and reflect, to give thanks and praise to God, and to celebrate achievement. The end of each term is marked by the celebration of Holy Communion, presided over by local clergy and attended by the whole school.

## Equal Opportunities at Crompton House School

At the end of their time with us, the young men and women of Crompton House will take their place in society as well educated, balanced, creative, caring and responsible citizens. The school is opposed to all forms of discrimination against individuals or groups on the grounds of race, gender, sexuality, disability, faith, class, age, ability or home background. We believe that each person is of equal value in the sight of God.







## Pastoral Care

### Induction

Students may be understandably nervous as they start secondary school. Pastoral care at Crompton House School starts before students begin their education here. In Year 6, students are visited at their primary schools by staff from Crompton House. Students visit school for an evening and on induction days to enable them to find out more through fun activities, and to meet their fellow students, teachers and form tutors.

When students start at school, they are gradually introduced into school routines, with additional staff and students dedicated to this process. Teachers collect and take students to lessons to help them find their way around; they have a separate early lunchtime with free meals initially. We have a simple cash-less dining system to remove the stress of carrying money around.

### Induction for Parents too

The relationship between parents and school is particularly important and right from the start we invite parents to welcome evenings whilst students are still in Year 6.

There are parents' evenings with subject teachers, and reports about progress throughout the year. On a day to day basis, parents receive regular communication through our electronic SchoolPost. Of course, we contact parents should there be any cause for concern, and parents are welcome to make an appointment to come into school and talk to staff at any time.

Many parents find that the school PTFA is a useful forum for sharing ideas and information with each other and the school, as well as supporting the school with valuable fundraising and great social events.

### Tutor Groups and Houses

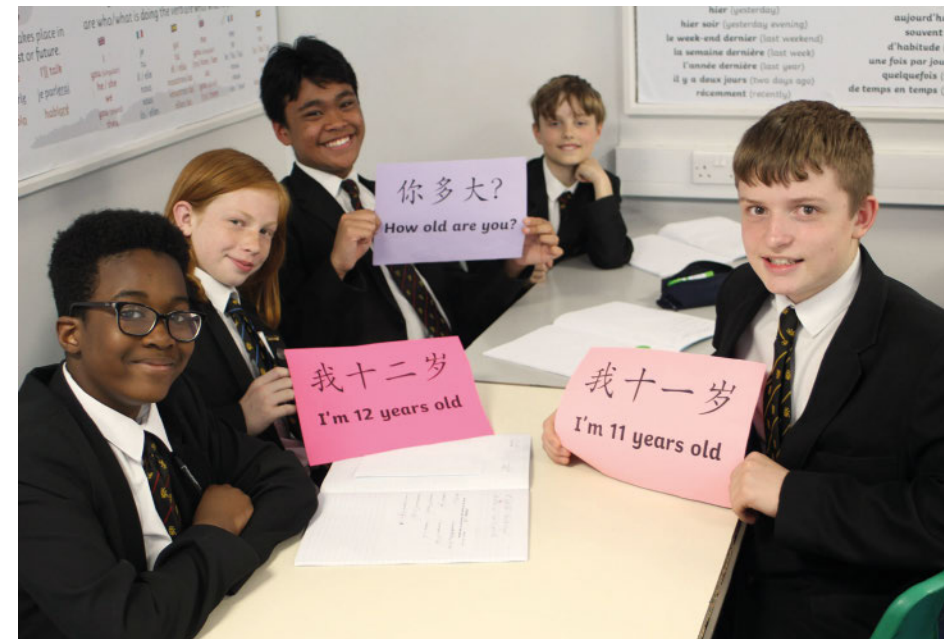
When pupils enter Crompton House to begin Year 7, they are allocated to a tutor group in one of four houses. The house system is used as a vehicle to encourage friendly competition. The tutor groups in which they are registered at the start of each morning include students from their own year group. There are approximately 27 students in each group. Tutor groups are named after prominent families associated with the history of the school: Cocker, Crompton, Ormerod and Ridley. Students normally stay in the same tutor group through to Year 11 with the same tutor. The allocation of tutor groups is a complicated task, especially when pupils come from over 60 different primary schools. We try to put students in a tutor group with someone they know, however this is not always possible.

### Students making decisions

Students are routinely involved in decision making at Crompton House School. Each house has form captains to help plan and organise house events and competitions in sports, arts, and other curriculum areas. Some students are trained as peer mentors, and for an anti-bullying team. Ideas are regularly shared with students through School Council, questionnaires and assemblies. Each half term, groups of students from different tutor groups meet with senior staff to discuss how things are going and suggest ideas for improvement.

### Getting to School

Many of our students travel to and from school by buses. These stop outside the school in Rochdale Road where there is a crossing patrol. At the end of the day, the three bus stops are supervised by Senior Staff. The school is on bus routes 402, 403 and R9/R10. Special buses (794 and 795) serve the Middleton area, (R10) for Milnrow. A private coach firm runs a service (88) for pupils in the Saddleworth area.

## Beyond The Classroom

Crompton House School offers a wonderful variety of activities both inside and outside normal school hours allowing students to develop confidence and excel in different ways. There is something for everyone, and staff are keen to respond to requests for new activities.

Throughout the year there are several competitions ranging from sports to arts, creative design and debating to name but a few. These are fun, but also help to build relationships between students and between students and staff. The House system breeds infectious enthusiasm.

Children who like sport will certainly find the choice and standard unbeatable. Athletics to volleyball, basketball to trampolining – the list goes on and on. Many students take part in teams after school and the school has an enviable record of success at borough and national levels.

Musical opportunities at Crompton House are among the best that any school can offer, with choirs, orchestras and bands covering all age and ability ranges. We present concerts in school and the local community, as well as taking part in events at the Bridgewater Hall and in Manchester Cathedral. Senior instrumental groups have played in the National Festival of Music for Youth at Symphony Hall, Birmingham. School choirs sing at local festivals and in cathedral services, and have visited York Minster, Manchester and Liverpool Cathedrals, in recent years.

Drama Clubs for all ages and abilities help to develop important transferable skills in communication, confidence building and social skills. Students have performed many times with great success at the Shakespeare Schools Festival, and many budding actors have developed their talents in school productions.

The Duke of Edinburgh's Award Scheme is very popular with students from Year 9 and above, with over two hundred pupils taking part each year. As well as the expedition, which is often the highlight of the award, "service" plays an important part and students make valuable contributions to the community in many diverse ways.

# Trips & Clubs

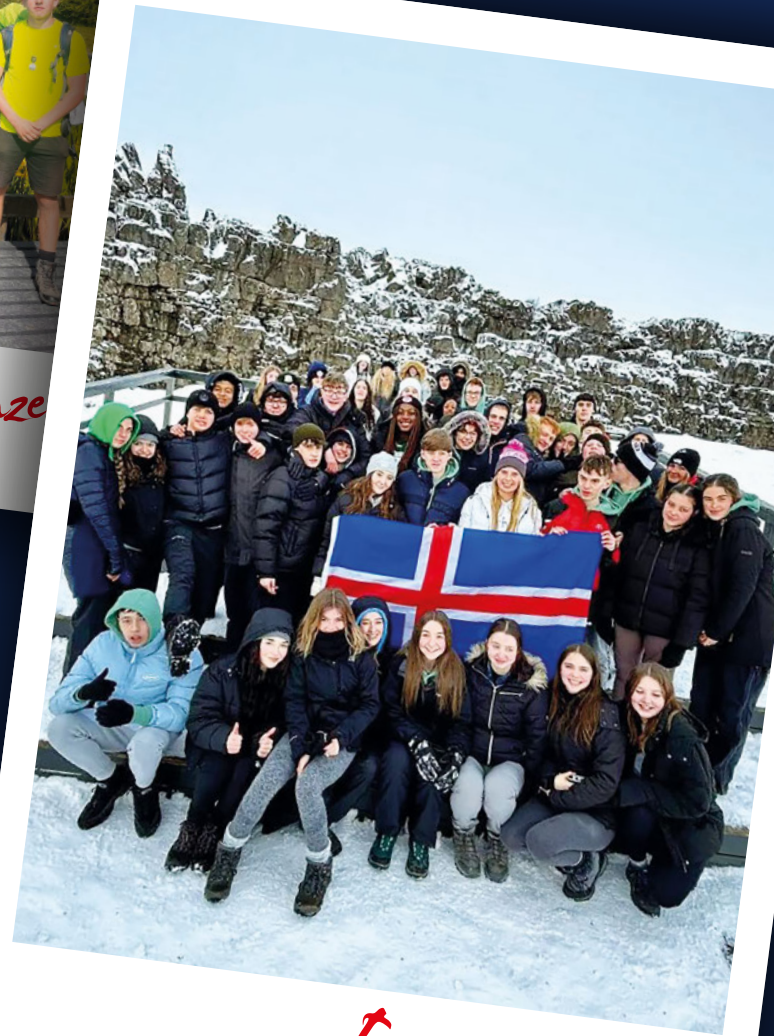

Crompton House is well known for the quality and quantity of school trips allowing students to extend their experiences across the curriculum. Most subjects extend the students' work through offsite experiences. There are Geography, History, Art, English and Biology curriculum trips amongst others. ## Uniform

As visitors to the school can see, we have high standards of uniform and appearance to demonstrate that the students are ready for learning. We always expect our students to wear full school uniform and maintain the highest possible standards of dress. We ask parents not to allow students to bring valuable items into school. The school cannot take any responsibility for loss or damage to personal items however caused.

## Attendance

The attendance of students at Crompton House is exceptional, and without doubt contributes significantly to the outstanding results achieved by students. From the 1st of September 2013 the law gave no entitlement to parents to take their child on holiday in term time unless there are exceptional and unique circumstances.

## Cashless Dining

We take great pride in the quality of the healthy meals on offer. Following parental feedback, we operate a cashless catering system which means that each individual student has their own account held on a central system within school. Once a student's account has been credited, he/she is able select food items from one of the dining rooms and pay by placing their finger on a scanning device. The system recognises the student and debits their account by the appropriate amount. There is a daily 'spend limit' programmed into the system.
