On the week commencing the 6th November, our school came together for remembrance week. It is always a special time in the year as we remember all of those who died during World War 1 as well as in other conflicts, including those happening today.

In our assemblies, led by Reverend Bec, student speakers shared the importance of the poppy and a poem 'For The Fallen' by Lawrence Binyan was read aloud. Displayed in the school corridors and on the crossroads were hand made poppies, a finger print display, and a book featuring stories written on grandparents and other family members who had lost their lives on the frontline.

At the end of the school week, on the 10th November, classrooms paused at 11am for a two minute silence. Only the the sound of students playing 'The Last Post' over the school tannoy could be heard. Safe Drive-Stay Alive

This month our Year 12 students made a trip to Middleton Arena for a session on driving safely.

The emotionally charged session showed students case studies from parents of the victims of fatal car accidents, advice and recollections from members of the emergency services who had witnessed the incidents, and a speech from a survivor, who had been walking in Manchester city centre when a driver crashed into him, distracted by a mobile phone, resulting in a life changing injury.

We would like to thank everyone who shared their experiences with our students. The impact this session had on our students was tremendous, shown through the feedback from parents of students who attended. One parent described the session as helping her son to understand the importance of driver safety and this will impact how they drive in the future,

Year 13 Trip to Criminology Conference

The year 13 Social Science students, along with Mrs Lomas and Mrs Owen, attended a trip in November to a Criminology Conference. We heard from experienced criminologists and delved into the world of crime, from ethnographic research to the criminal justice process. Students were able to apply some of their knowledge on theories of crime from their Psychology and Sociology studies to the crimes they heard at the conference.

A highlight of the day was listening to the life stories of previous offenders - Justin Rollins and the Mafia Princess: Marisa Merico -Marisa is the daughter of one of Italy's biggest Mafia bosses. She became involved in her father's business in her teens, and her subsequent involvement led to her serving a 2-year prison sentence in the UK for money laundering. Since then, she has trained as a Criminologist and is currently working alongside third sector organisations, in various areas of the Criminal Justice System and with research partners such as Lancaster University.

Justin Rollins - Justin grew up on the streets of south London and was once the leader of a graffiti gang. He served time for a violent crime, but now he's a professional graffiti artist and works with youth groups. Rollins is a tagging talent who now uses his art to turn lives around. He's a street-smart artist who is making a difference in the community.

Students were so enthralled by their stories that many of them bought Marisa and Justin's books to uncover their stories even further.

This talk was organised to give pupils an insight into the different pathways that are available studying Languages and/or Business at Alevel and degree level, as well as real life examples of globalisation and international trading, which are an essential part of the A-level Business and Economics courses.








The Changing Faces Charity


