Our Bronze Duke of Edinburgh team went on their first expedition around Ogden Reservoir in February.


Our spring group were amazing, tackling the cold and muddy terrain, with all of the team making it to the end.

At Crompton House School

LGBTQ+ History Month is a UK wide event that takes place throughout February. As a school proud to be working towards the Rainbow Flag Award, Crompton House is committed to building an inclusive environment, where everyone belongs. Our pupils took part in a range of activities this month.

We kicked off the celebrations in our first Worship assembly, focusing on why we celebrate LGBTQ+ History Month and this year's theme of #Underthescope, which celebrates key LGBTQ+ figures past and present, who have made significant contributions to Medicine and Science.

We were also very lucky to have some key visitors in school, including Manchester Storm elite ice hockey players Zach Sullivan and Michael Korol for a Q&A session. Zach is the first and only openly LGBTQ+ ice hockey player in the world and a Stonewall Champion.

Year 9 and 10 attended a talk from the youth writer Josh Silver. Josh is an LGBTQ author from Manchester, trained at RADA and has performed in the West End. He changed careers from mental health nursing to being a writer. His book Happy Head was awarded the Amazon best YA book of 2023 and is nominated for the 2024 Carnegie Award. His next book comes out in May and he is just finishing his third. Josh said the following about our school:

"It was a real genuine pleasure to be at Crompton House. Not only did I feel immediately welcomed by the lovely reception staff, but every staff member I met went beyond to make me feel welcomed. Obviously the brilliant Claire Cullen proving that librarians are vital to young people having access to varied points of view through books, and her passion is infectious.

"Sometimes I am scared as an LGBT author coming into church schools. However at Crompton House I felt an active push towards inclusivity from all staff. The tone has been set by you all - as it should be - and I was so pleased and grateful. Often schools will say they are inclusive to tick boxes - but you are doing the real work. The kids were respectful and listened. This is a big achievement believe me - it has sadly not always been the case".

Our Pride Group also received a visit from Father Paul on Queer Theology and what it means to be LGBTQ+ and a Christian in today's world. Revered Bec also covered a Tuesday Chat on LOVE and the many forms this can take.

Finally, year 7 wrote rainbow positive messages of hope and support to LGBTQ+ people struggling with their sexuality or gender identity. These will be made into a rainbow display and will be proudly pinned up in our school. Thank you to everyone involved in the organisation and participation of these events!



Land of Fire and Ice - Y11 Geography trip to Iceland

In February we went on our Year 11 geography trip to Iceland. On the morning of our trip, we learned that a volcano close by to the airport had erupted, which made for a once in a lifetime opportunity to see an erupting volcano live, directly from the plane. Before settling at our hotel on the first night, we visited natural mud pools, which is when we all realised that it was, in fact, very cold.

After some traditional Icelandic food and a good night's rest, we were all prepared for our first full day. First, we walked up Sólheimajökull Glacier, which was an amazing experience, with the help of guides who were keen to tell us about the history, and the challenges that the glacier will face in the future. We then visited the stunning Skógafoss and Seljalandsfoss waterfalls, and the Black Sand Beach, which were all truly unique experiences.

Over the course of the weekend, we also toured the Golden Circle, which consists of the Gullfoss Waterfall, Pingvellir National Park, and a natural geyser. Due to the volcanic eruption on the day we arrived in Iceland, our originally planned destination, the Blue Lagoon, was closed, so we instead visited the Secret Lagoon, which was a perfect way to spend our last day. We then explored the centre of Reykjavík, the capital of Iceland, where we shopped for souvenirs, and were treated to a meal in the Hamburger Factory, which ended our day perfectly. After having some time to reflect on the trip, we would like to say how grateful we are to Mr Douglas and the team of teachers for giving us the opportunity to see such a beautiful county.

It truly was an incredible experience!



Our Red Nose Day 2024




























CHS Pi Competition
