Crompton House achieves Gold in School Mental Health Award!

The School Mental Health Award is delivered by the Carnegie Centre of Excellence for Mental Health in Schools. Crompton House have been awarded the **gold standard** for our outstanding mental health and wellbeing provision.

Mrs Hegarty said: "We are incredibly proud to have achieved this award, which reflects our deep commitment to the wellbeing of every member of our school community. At the heart of our ethos —Loving God, Caring for Each Other, and Achieving Excellence —is a belief that true success comes from growing the whole person. This award recognises the dedication of our staff, students, and families in creating a compassionate and supportive environment where everyone can thrive."

"This recognition is not just an award; it represents the real, tangible impact our mental health support has had on our students. Through our dedicated pastoral care, wellbeing initiatives, and strong culture of openness, we have seen students grow in confidence, resilience, and academic achievement. They feel more supported, better equipped to face challenges, and able to flourish in a school environment where mental health is prioritised".

A focal point of the school's mental health and wellbeing provision is to develop a marked improvement in the emotional and psychological wellbeing of our students, as evidenced by the results of our recent Bee Well survey. Our students report lower levels of emotional and behavioural difficulties compared to national averages, demonstrating that they feel more supported and less anxious. Our efforts to create an environment where students feel heard, supported, and valued have resulted in a more positive and inclusive school culture.

I'm delighted to say that Crompton House finished in 1st place when competing against six other schools in the STEM challenge and have done themselves and the school very proud.






CHS takes the cheer to Jamfest 2025

Sixth Form University Offers


We are delighted to be able to share a few bits of information about some wonderful offers some of our Sixth Form students have received in response to their University Applications.

Judge's feedback top left: What a fun and vibrant photograph, the colour's really pops in this image. I really like the close crop which helps draw your attention to the subject, in addition the earth tones of the book really contrast to the colour's around the bed once again drawing your eyes down. The subjects pose works well and it gives you the feeling of peace and relaxation.

Judge's feedback bottom left: A great photograph which contains fantastic natural light, I particularly appreciate the hair light that creates wonderful shape and form. The dynamic cropping works particularly well incorporating the rule of thirds within the left vertical quadrant. This crop makes the image feel more dynamic and allows you to appreciate the surrounding trees in the background.

Accompanying explanation: The inspiration of my photograph was nature and how the sun and peaceful surroundings of nature can bring joy to people, equally as reading can, particularly regarding benefiting their mental health. This photo was taken in Healey Dell Nature Reserve.

What does it mean to be human?

During the Autumn/Spring term, Sixth Form students have enjoyed 3 drop-down Wednesday afternoons looking at the theme 'What does it mean to be human?' In this series we explored some of the most profound questions and issues that are currently shaping our political, philosophical, scientific and religious discussions. On 13th November, Professor Dian Donnai (vice chair of the Adelphi Genetics Forum) explored the religious and ethical dilemmas of genetic engineering. On 11th December, Dr Gavin Merrifield (Gen Sec for Manchester Christians in Science) explored the religious and ethical dilemmas surrounding Artificial Intelligence. Finally, on 26th March, students on our Sixth Form Medical Society team led our final session exploring religious and ethical dilemmas surrounding Euthanasia.

Students commented on how thought-provoking the discussions were as they raised issues and questions they had not considered before and challenged traditional beliefs about the nature of humanity, consciousness and the divine: "the talk made me think of situations which I have never considered before... I think it was an eye-opener for our future, and it made me wonder how these developments will affect our future moving forwards."

We are deeply grateful to our Medical Society Team (Jessica Greenwood, Inayah Javed, Emilia Jakowska and Destiny Duru) for the thoughtful, sensitive and professional manner in which they led the debate on Euthanasia.


