ACTION & ADVENTURE IN KENYA - 2025

In July an intrepid group of Yr12's finally arrived in Kenya after 12 months of fundraising and practice walks up Yr Wyddfa and Scafell Pike, all of which was extremely worth it.

The trip lasted for 2 busy weeks during which there was community action, a physical challenge (trekking up Mt Kenya), and safari's at the end. The greatest privilege was to share our experiences with beneficiaries of the Moving Mountains charity and to know how our money is helping to transform lives.

Our first 5 days were in the rural area of Embu on the outer slopes of Mt Kenya, where we handed over football boots and trainers (gratefully received) and met up with the Kenyan beneficiaries and peers who we would share much of the experience with. In Embu we worked with the beneficiaries from Moving Mountains and painted a new dormitory and staff quarters at St Monica's Special School allowing furniture to be put in the following day and making it ready for use in the academic year. We then completed painting the building and classrooms at a new Early Years school on the outskirts of Embu, this was to allow the new provision to provide for preschool children who currently have nothing, so just spend days on the village roads.

We also visited an Early Years project where we did some impromptu teaching and students helped prepare meals at the Rescue Centre which provides approx. 150 meals a day to street children who wouldn't otherwise receive a meal. A final reality check on how privileged we are at CH was a visit to some of our Kenyan peers homes which consisted of 1 room tin shacks, to hear about their day to day lives.

The second part of the trip was the big physical challenge of climbing Mt Kenya (the 2nd highest mountain in Africa). This involved a steady start on the lower slopes in the cloud forest, seeing monkeys and beautiful birds until reaching the first camp. The second day was a tough day trekking through the vertical bog and steeper valley to the second camp where we spent a 3rd day doing a small extra acclimatisation walk and preparing for the 2.00am start for the summit on day 4. Fantastically and despite some students feeling some minor effects of altitude at 7.30am 100% of those who set off made it to the summit. This was a real display of grit, determination, resilience and support for each other – a brilliant achievement from all of which we are most proud.

Finally, we spent several days in the Nakuru National Park and Lake Naivasha areas. During this time we stood on the Equator (seeing the Coriolis effect in action), we saw a great range of African wildlife from a truck safari, a lake boat trip and a cycle ride to Hell's Gate, all of which had their own distinct character and rewards i.e. rhino, giraffe, zebra, water buffalo, warthogs, eagles...

The final experiences of the trip were a drive through Kibera slum (the largest in Africa) and a stop at the Moving Mountains office literally just down the road from it. Our students were fantastic throughout – open to new experiences, throwing themselves into all activities and showing great humour and empathy. They were a credit to themselves and the school. As the final trip that I will organise for CH, I couldn't have had a better group or experience and I hope some of them will revisit Kenya with MM in the future.

Moving Mountains Trust were our support / guides throughout the trip. They run a variety of development projects in Kenya & Nepal supporting educational, social welfare and health needs. Each project empowers local people and offers genuine benefits for the local communities.


























































A Talk With The Lords

On Friday October 10th, the year-12 students who selected politics as one of their A-levels had the privilege to speak to a member of the House of Lords, Lord Mott. Over a team's call with Mr. Mason, he introduced himself, stating he had been a member of the Lords for over 2 years and was selected by Rishi Sunak when he was Prime Minister.

A classroom full of students each asked him a question, to which he gave brilliantly detailed answers, really helping us understand his crucial role as a Peer in the House of Lords. Some questions were fascinating such as did he want to be a member of the Lords, rather than an MP, what he thought about the current structure of the Lords and his current views on political parties currently in power.

His answers were interesting and unusual, such as saying because he said he wanted to make pastry when he left sixth form rather than be a member of the Lords and fell into politics by complete accident, Lord Mott was very knowledgeable with well-informed opinions about the issues within the House ofLords and potential solutions to fix them. He was impressed with the quality of questions given.

Overall, this exclusive interaction benefited us as students greatly as we gained a fantastic insight into how the House of Lords operates and was a fascinating experience to meet such an influential member within our Parliament.

The end of last term was exceptionally busy as our Futures programme saw a fantastic array of visitors coming into Crompton House to help expand our students understanding of the world of work and future opportunities that are to be found in Greater Manchester.

In June Yr10 took part in a Post 16 Futures day. This provided an opportunity for students to choose 9 sessions from a massive range of A Level subjects and over 20 employers, colleges and universities. The sessions were designed to give a 'taste' of what it would be like studying a subject or following a vocational pathway after Yr11. The day was a huge success and thank you so much to all who came and delivered sessions.

Places on degree apprenticeships are hard won and to help our students who are interested in this route we organised mock interviews (as part of our Higher Ed/Post 18 days) from representatives of a range of companies/sectors e.g. British Airways, Koderly Software, Oldham College, Rail Engineering, Law, Wrightbuild Ltd, Sellafield nuclear engineering and Languages and property management. This was a really useful exercise as it provides a more real feel to the practice process. Students also received a session on creating their digital profile and backpack from Liz Whiteley our Enterprise Advisor from Methods.

As a part of a national careers initiative (Equalex) Crompton House has been awarded a place as a pilot school for looking at broadening students' experiences of careers across their time in school. As a part of this we have been partnered with three national/international companies — Siemens, Autotrader and AtkinsRealis. In July representatives of these companies came in and presented to and worked with, students in Years 8, 9, 10 and 12. This was massively positive for those involved and we look forward to continuing to develop these partnerships.

Helping them build life-long belief in themselves, supporting them to take on their own challenges, follow their passions, and discover talents they never knew they had. The Duke of Edinburgh's Award is open to any young person aged 14-24. Participants build their own programmes – choosing activities and a cause to volunteer for, in order to achieve a Bronze, Silver or Gold DofE Award. In 2024/25, more than 342,000 young people started their DofE, with participants giving more than 5.2 million hours of volunteering in their communities.

The sum of hours volunteered to chosen causes from CHS pupils was an incredible 3731 hours, this is truly an incredible achievement and testament to each and every participant's dedication to reaching their targets. For anybody who isn't yet aware of what the MEGA Hub is all about, here's a brief excerpt from a recent press release - "With every secondary school in Oldham set to participate by the end of 2026, the MEGA (motivated, educated generation with ambition) Hub, developed by professional technology skills provider <u>IN4 Group</u> in partnership with Oldham Council, is designed to equip students with the skills and career pathways needed to thrive in the tech sector. Funded by Oldham Council and IN4 Group, along with global tech companies including IBM, KPMG UK, Northrop Grumman, CGI, QinetiQ, Roke, and BT, the MEGA Hub provides local students hands-on experiences in AI, cyber security, coding, virtual reality and machine learning. This extensive super curriculum includes extra-curricular days and an out-of-school Cyber and Esports Academy, which will launch in the summer term. Thirty young people from each school will have the opportunity to form their own esports teams. They will also gain valuable insights into the business and entrepreneurial aspects of esports, as well as knowledge of cyber security and the importance of wellbeing, teamwork and problem-solving."

Parking reminder

We regularly receive complaints about inconsiderate and dangerous parking around Crompton House School. Examples include parking on pavements, causing obstructions, blocking driveways, parking on yellow lines, and allowing children to exit vehicles whilst stopped on School Keep Clear 'zigzags' or in queuing traffic. This standard of driving and parking is unacceptable and may put our students at risk.

We request that you adhere to the following when parking, dropping off or collecting children from school:

- Keep the School Keep Clear marking 'zigzags' clear
- Avoid parking on the single yellow lines around school
- Ensure pavements, residents' driveways and pedestrian access points are kept clear
- Ensure emergency vehicles would be able to get past if needed
- Drive slowly and with extra care around school gates
- Behave in a manner than is respectful towards others, including pedestrians and residents
- Park further away from school if possible

Drivers committing offences place themselves at risk of being prosecuted/issued with tickets. More importantly, inconsiderate and dangerous parking outside schools puts lives at risk.

By working together, we can ensure a safer environment for everyone and set a positive example for our children about road safety and consideration for others.
